The FTC Board election will take place at this year's Annual Meeting. The bylaws for selecting and nominating candidates are listed below. If you would like to make a recommendation to the nominating committee, please contact Bill Baskin at wpb3@ftc-i.net or 803.428.7602.

Article 6

2. Procedure for Board Nominations:

(a) A nominating committee consisting of three (3) or five (5) board members shall be appointed by the chairman, for the purpose of seeking qualified board candidates. The nominating committee shall allow conference members, in addition to board members, to make recommendations and to thus participate in the selection of board candidates. (b) In addition to making recommendations to the nominating committee, conference members may make nominations by filing a document, bearing signatures of at least ten (10) members, with the nominating committee at least six weeks prior to the annual meeting.

FOOTHILLS TRAIL CONFERENCE

Friday

#1—Sloan Bridge to Ellicott's Rock on Fork Mountain Trail. Enjoy the colors of fall along the mystical Chattooga River and explore the Ellicott's Rock area with Cathy Reas Foster, Foothills Trail Conference board member. The hike begins on the Chattooga River Trail at Burrells Ford with a stop at Spoon Auger Falls before connecting to the Foothills Trail that leads up river to Ellicott's Rock. After lunch and adventures finding the rock, hikers will take the Fork Mt. Spur Trail and finish at Sloan Bridge. Shuttle required. This 12-mile hike is rated very strenuous with an elevation gain of 3,000 ft. Bring lunch, snacks, water, hiking shoes, and a camera! Meet Cathy at Sloan Bridge at 8:30 a.m.

#2—Lee Falls Hike. This hike will begin by assembling at the parking lot in Oconee State Park below the Ranger's office and store at noon on Friday, November 2, 2012. We will carpool to the trailhead for a 1.6 mile hike one way, (3.2 round trip). This is an out and back hike. This hike is rated difficult because of the first two crossings of a fairly large stream, Tamassee Creek and particularly for the last ¼ mile to the falls which is steep and scrambling over boulders and trees. The majority of the hike is an easy walk through 4 meadows and some forest walking. This 90' waterfall is one of the most spectacular in the Upstate and one of my top favorites. The flowers are always great while still in season. Be prepared for wet feet and beautiful pictures. Led by Dan Whitten.

Saturday

#3—Upper Whitewater Falls to Lower Whitewater Falls and Bad Creek. Join Master Naturalist and Foothills Trail Conference board member Dan Whitten on this strenuous 6-mile walk that will start at Upper Whitewater Falls and continue to Lower Whitewater Falls, finishing at Duke Energy's Bad Creek Hydro Project. Shuttle required. Bring water and lunch. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

#4—Bartram Trail Hike to Rabun Bald. John Ray, Foothills Trail Conference member, will lead a hike on the Georgia section of the Bartram Trail from Beegum Gap (3,600 feet) to the summit of Rabun Bald, at 4,696 feet Georgia's second highest mountain and the highest in a semi-primitive state. The hike will follow the old fire tower road to the summit in 1.6 miles and return the same way. Outstanding views of three states are available from the observation tower. The drive from Oconee State Park to the trailhead is more than an hour. This hike is limited to 15 people or three cars because of parking limitations at Beegum Gap. Wear hiking shoes and bring lunch, water, camera and binoculars. This hike will be strenuous. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

ANNUAL MEETING 2012 HIKES AND OUTINGS!!

- **#5—Oconee Family Nature Walk**. Learn about plants and animals on an easy walk around Oconee State Park with Dr. Rocky Nation, naturalist and professor at Southern Wesleyan University. Bring a drink and a magnifying glass and/or binoculars. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30-11 a.m.
- **#6—Fall Color Hike**. Join Master Naturalist and Foothills Trail Conference member Steve Marlowe on a moderate 5-mile walk of gorgeous fall colors on the Foothills Trail from Whitewater Falls to Sloan Bridge. Shuttle required. Bring lunch, snacks and plenty of water. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.
- #7—Yellow Branch Falls. Plinio Beres, river ranger with the U.S. Forest Service, will lead this moderate 3-mile round-trip walk to one of the prettiest cascades in Upstate South Carolina. This out-and-back trail leads hikers to the base of a spectacular 50-foot vertical cascade. On the way, the trail passes through groves of dignified hardwoods and crosses meandering creek bottoms. Bring lunch, snacks and plenty of water. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- #8—Gorges State Park Visitors Center Tour. Visit the beautiful new Visitors Center at Gorges State Park with one of the area's most breathtaking views of the Jocassee Gorges region. Gorges State Park Ranger Kevin Bischof will give a guided tour of the new center and some of the nearby areas in the North Carolina state park. Meet at Gorges State Park at 10:30 a.m. The Grassy Ridge entrance of Gorges State Park is about 8 miles from Upper Whitewater Falls on NC 281.
- **#9—Maintenance Hikes**. Help out with upkeep on the Foothills Trail with Foothills Trail Conference board members Les Storm and Jack Hudish and others. There may be more than one maintenance hike, so plenty of strong backs are needed! Bring gloves, a favorite tool, lunch and plenty to drink. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Sunday

- **#10—Long Creek Falls**. Join Jerry Harvey, Foothills Trail Conference board member, on a moderate hike of about 1.8 miles (one-way) down to Long Creek Falls (last 200' steep down), a popular stop for paddlers on Section Four of the Chattooga River. Bring water, snacks and lunch. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.
- #11—Tamassee Knob. Join Bobbie Wilhite, Foothills Trail Conference board member, on this moderate to strenuous round-trip hike of about three hours on the Tamassee Knob Trail within Oconee State Park. The Tamassee Knob Trail features a number of scenic overlooks. Meet at Oconee State Park lodge. Bring lunch and water. 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

WINTON PORTER FEATURED GUEST SPEAKER AT 2012 ANNUAL MEETING



Ever since starting his lawn-mowing business at age 10, author Winton Porter has found it hard to stay indoors. At 21 he opened his own B. Bumblefoot and Co., producing hiking sticks for retailers throughout the U.S. southeast. And for years he tried the corporate route—selling gear and managing operations at such retailers as REI in Chicago, Salt Lake City, and Atlanta. In 2001, at age 35, he ransacked his 401k and bought the venerable Mountain Crossings store, a hiker's Mecca deep in the Georgia woods near the southern end of the Appalachian Trail. It's a blissful match for the lifelong outdoorsman and natural-born storyteller. Now called the Guru of

the Appalachian Trail, Winton is famous for his "shakedowns" to help weary hikers lighten their loads. Winton's knowledge and expertise has also recently landed him an endorsement deal with Patagonia Footwear's new "Zero Impact Backpacking Boot". When he's not busy selling boots and shipping hikers' boxes home, he's writing about the zany adventurers that populate the trail and his store. Winton's memory for dialogue, eye for detail, compassion for those in trouble, and gift for humor come together in the 27 chapters that make up his first book.



SASSAFRAS MOUNTAIN PRESS CONFERENCE

Dozens of environmental supporters were in attendance, despite periodic rain showers, to hear South Carolina's senior Senator, Lindsay Graham, make remarks announcing improvements that are planned for the summit of Sassafras Mountain, the highest point in South Carolina, and a trailhead for the Foothills Trail. Some of the improvements had already taken place, such as the newly paved road from Rocky Bottom to the parking lot near the summit, and a viewing

platform constructed by SC DNR.

Most of the Foothills Trail Board was present to hear Senator Graham; Alvin A. Taylor, SC DNR Director; Michael Leonard, Vice Chairman of the Conservation Fund; and Jennifer H. Willis, Chairperson of Pickens County Council, and others give their thoughts on how environmentally and historically significant the area around Sassafras Mountain is and the need for it to become better known to the public in general.

A brief synopsis of the overall project, which will include handicap access to the summit, several strategic viewpoints,

and a viewing tower, was given by Dan Harding, an architecture professor at Clemson University, who has been engaged by SC DNR to develop concepts for the summit area.

The Foothills Trail Conference is well "plugged in" with this project and is looking forward to the additional attention the Trail will receive when these improvements are made.

Additional information on the project will be presented at the annual meeting during the Saturday social hour.
